

OHORONGO OPENINGS

Two new camps have opened in the Ohorongo Private Reserve. a 35.000-hectare wilderness between Etosha National Park and Swakopmund. Set in a converted homestead, the rustic Ohorongo Safari Lodge provides a selection of ensuite thatchand-tile chalets, while on the western side of the reserve is the Ohorongo Tented Camp, with five stylish tented suites nestled amidst a dramatically rocky landscape of granite boulders and sweeping desert views.

A RIVER RUNS THROUGH IT

Opening in June, African Bush Camps' new Lolebezi Lodge promises "lighton-earth luxury" in a remote setting in the Lower Zambezi National Park. Enjoying over a kilometre of river frontage, the lodge will offer a full range of safari activities backed up by an array of facilities including a canopy walkway, private "river pods" and even an open-air cinema surrounded by giant acacias. Guest suites are designed to 'float' above the landscape, allowing water to pass underneath during heavy rains. The camp will be powered by a dedicated solar farm and will have a staged water treatment system.
